

THE RHYME AND REASON OF

REACHING GENERATIONS

God, you have taught me from my youth, and I still proclaim your wondrous works. Even while I am old and gray, God, do not abandon me, while I proclaim your power to another generation, your strength to all who are to come. Psalm 71: 17-18, CSB

've claimed this scripture as my own for some time now as it reflects both my life mission and ongoing prayer. I have participated in student ministry at some level for more than 50 years now. As a teenaged 'Boomer' in the '70s I was blessed to be apart of a substantially large and healthy student ministry. When I got out of college in the early '80s my first ministry post was as a youth pastor to the emerging 'Generation X' also known as 'Busters'. I quickly learned that what I experienced as a teenager was not how this generation was facing life and faith. There were distinctive differences.

In the '90s I was able to minister to students who were of 'Generation Y', more widely known as Millennials. And as I moved into the 21st century I've been blessed to work in a ministry these last 23 years that has bridged from reaching Millennials to 'Gen Z'... and even now to the rising of 'Alpha Generation'.

As I recall the blessings I've had to engage each generation over the years, I'm also able to discern what I'm calling a 'generational rhyme' that, I believe, is present in the

spiritual trajectory over the last several decades.

My experience with 'Busters', who were deemed as the unwanted generation, reflected the state of broken families, many of whom were affected by the Roe v Wade ruling and no-fault divorce. They were latchkey kids and they embraced the anti-social grunge culture. This generation began a movement away from traditional church experiences.

My '90's youth group were Millennials... the 'Me generation'. Schedules were loaded as parents made sure that the kids got to all the sports and activities that they were interested in. This often resulted in families being too busy to go to church. Tolerance and social awareness was expanding in our educational systems as spiritual

skepticism grew regarding the institution of the church.

Gen Z of the 2000's' moved deeper into spiritual skepticism and transitioned from tolerance to affirming and even celebrating diversity with regards to sexual identity among other things. Their engagement of tech was unprecedented as it nearly dictated how they were to engage in relationships and determine self worth. And in this generation we've witnessed even a greater migration away from church participation

I've heard recently that history doesn't necessarily repeat itself as it more often rhymes. I see a rhyming in each of these generations with regards to a degradation of identity, purpose and destiny in our kids. Satan has steadily progressed in his mission "to steal, kill, and destroy" each succeeding generation. And sadly, with each passing generation, we have witnessed a movement away from sound biblical teaching and deep discipleship engagement to a religion of attraction and appeasement.

That is why First Priority has for 25 years had as its intention and focus to help students find the answers to the core philosophical and spiritual life questions found only in the Hope of Christ: "Who am I?", "Why am I here?", and "Where am I going?".

As you have partnered with our First Priority ministry team through prayer and patronage, we have been on mission to help students find: Their **identity** in **Christ** through salvation and spiritual maturity; Their **purpose** to live on mission to reach their friends on their **Campus** with a gospel; Their **destiny** is heaven as a member of the **Church**, the Bride of Christ. This is, I believe, the reason the ministry of First Priority has been so richly blessed by God these many years. Also why you, our ministry friends, continue to support us... trusting that we will hold fastly to this high and most needed calling. To support the church in a Biblical, spiritually countercultural revolution.

Thank you for the role you are playing to reach today's students. May God bless our efforts to help them find their true identity, purpose and destiny in Christ Jesus... 'to proclaim His power to another generation, His strength to all who are to come!'

ame Day is a FREE, fast-paced, sixty-minute, faith-based club that meets once a week with outdoor fun and Bible based lessons on critical character values. Our goal is to create a fun, safe, and enriching environment for students from 3rd-5th grade. We are focused on elementary students because studies show that nearly 85% of people that make decisions for Christ, do so between the ages of 4 to 14! To reach the lost in this age group via a campus club, we need a YES from a School Principal, a YES from a willing Teacher Sponsor and a YES from a church partner with volunteers that understand that there is a race to a child's heart, and it is imperative that we get there first.

Last year we ended the school year with 42 clubs and over 1,400 students and over 600 students made decisions for Christ. We praise God for the outstanding growth we have seen in Game Day in the first few months of the 2023-2024 school year. By the end of November, we will have launched 47 clubs and have well over 1,600 students! God has continued to open doors and we are privileged to boldly walk through them in His wisdom and strength.

We are seeing parents truly excited to sign up their children. Here are some amazing facts that we give all glory to God for:

- Our average club size is over 30!
- At Challenger Elementary we saw over 60 students register within 24 hours of the invite going out!
- Our Northcrest Club started last year with 3 students. This year our club started with over 20 and now has 48 students!
- In Silver Shores we have 16% of the student population at our Game Day club on Wednesday afternoons!
- One of our newest schools, North Andrews Gardens, has over 80 students registered!

We couldn't do any of this without our incredible church partners. While we have a thriving relationship with churches with thousands of members, we have seen God do amazing things with small and medium sized churches as well! Some of our biggest clubs are with church partners that have less than 300 people in








attendance each week. Game Day is blessed to have a wonderful partnership with Daybreak Assembly in Tamarac. They

currently have 2 Game Day clubs and 1 Epic middle school club! They are at Tamarac Elementary and North Broward Academy of Excellence. Both of those Game Day clubs have over 60 students each! They have an outstanding team of 16 volunteers that faithfully serve on Thursdays and Fridays led by Pastor Alan and Pastor Michelle Alexander. When they first connected with us they said they had been praying for a way to partner with local schools in their community and when they heard about Game Day, they knew God was opening the door!

Game Day is really a wonderful outreach opportunity that, thanks to generous financial partners, is free to the school, church and students. It is designed to be "plug and play": simple for church leaders to implement in their local schools and reach unchurched students. We know from our registrations that only 47% of our students attend church on a regular basis, while 24% don't attend at all. We are thankful that this year, 81 families have specifically stated they are looking for a church and our club leaders can personally invite them to church. When parents register their students, they are provided with an invitation and direct link to the partner church's website. Club leaders are encouraged to bring invite cards to their clubs to personally invite the students to special events. We have seen students coming out to these wonderful "outreach" events because they received an invite at Game Day!

We would love to see even more church partners take hold of the vision and join us! This truly is an unbelievable opportunity to go into public schools and bring the Gospel to students who might otherwise never step over the threshold of a church. As someone once said, "When you have the opportunity of a lifetime, you have to take advantage of it during the lifetime of the opportunity". We know we are living in the last days, and our time is running short to reach as many as possible with the love and light of Jesus. Next, he brought a great team together made up of staff members and volunteers that worked diligently to plan, gather items, and invite people to our auction. As we approached the weeks leading up to the auction it was clear we would have a solid amount of good quality items so we shifted gears and focused on getting more people to attend our event. With just a week to go, we found ourselves oversold! But, we made sure everyone who wanted to be there, was there.

From the beautiful space to the mood-setting student jazz band, to inspiring student leader testimonies, and of course the amazing generosity. By the end of the night, we had exceeded our goal and raised almost \$120,000 to reach students with the Hope of Christ. Throughout this entire process, I have been so encouraged by the overwhelming support given by so many people to make the night special. After the night ended, I was just in awe of all God had done. I really want everyone to know that God is doing something special in Miami-Dade and I am so glad that many were able to experience that firsthand at this year's Auction.

We were on track for a strong start when it seemed our efforts were stopped short upon receiving news of a new policy in place in Broward County; the State of Florida issued permission slips for every public school that require a parent's signature for students to attend any clubs or extracurricular activities on campus. The optics of getting every student to complete and hand in a form prior to attending club seemed a challenge, BUT one that has made our clubs be more intentional in prayer and in inviting others to club. Through God's faithfulness, students are rolling with the punches and clubs are thriving!

Of the 80 clubs running in Broward, our most powerful wins are the recent club launch at Pine Crest School and the seasoned club at Taravella High School. We have been working diligently over the last 25 years to launch a First

Priority club on the campus of Pine Crest School and God finally made a way! A student on campus worked through the process with the school administration and Pine Crest ended up having 26 students at their first club meeting! Also, highlighting the impact of student leaders is the club at Taravella High School. This club is completely student led! While a teacher and mentor are present, the students lead each other through prayer and a lesson. It's amazing to see these clubs experience God's favor as their clubs grow.

Despite various setbacks this year our clubs are determined to meet every week to share the Gospel, but there are still many more clubs just waiting to get started. They just need you! How can you make a difference? While the goal is to have every club be completely student led, the First Priority process requires a Godly mentor to be present at every club. We would love to partner with you and with your church to make sure every student hears the Gospel message and has the opportunity to grow within a church family.

Teachers' jobs have never been more difficult; with added responsibilities, larger classes, and less support, teachers are experiencing stress at work. That's why we are so grateful for our First Priority faculty sponsors that sacrifice their personal time to go above and beyond what is required of them. Their choice to step up as the sponsor is what legally allows students to even have a First Priority club.

When a faculty sponsor like Sarah Call comes

along and has a sustained impact on her campus, it is a huge deal! Sarah has faithfully been a teacher sponsor for 15 years and has so many God stories to share on how First Priority has impacted the lives of many students. She shared this one with me: "I had a student in high school who had a troubled middle school experience, started coming to First Priority, ended up being a leader of the club and brought others to Christ using his talent of spoken word! He then came on staff at Christ Fellowship Boynton, is shining bright in the community with youth and pastoral services, and now has a podcast."

Sarah is a great example to the students at Boca Raton High School and believes that every school should have a First Priority club. She shares, "Sometimes you are the only Jesus someone meets, having a First Priority club on campus shows students there is hope, there



is love, and they do matter. With so many influences, substances, peer pressure, and problems racing for the attention of our youth, it is important to be a

part of the race toward their heart!"

We simply could not do what we do without Sarah, and the almost 300 faculty members like her that serve as First Priority club faculty sponsors on their school campus.

od is doing amazing things in First Priority clubs all along the Treasure Coast. We are currently on 18 school campus in Martin, St. Lucie, and Okeechobee counties. One of the key components in making an impact on our campus clubs is outstanding student leadership.

Student leadership is not only a First Priority core value, but it is also a legal obligation we have in clubs on campus. All First Priority clubs are designed to be student initiated and student led. This allows us to work closely with students to help them be prepared, organized, and focused in leading their First Priority club. When some people hear that our clubs are student led, they are a bit nervous of what that may look like on a campus. How effective can students be at leading a club? Will other students listen and focus when a peer is leading? Can you trust a teenager to share the gospel to other teenagers?

Here are some things we know from our experience with student leadership:

- 1. Students are the most effective people to share with other students. When a person of a similar age and life experience shares the gospel, there is a 60% greater chance that the person listening will make a definitive response.
- 2. When students are guided and mentored to lead, they are full of passion and zeal that will overcome some insecurities they may have.
- 3. Students are incredibly creative and resilient when sharing their faith.

Here are a couple of quick stories to help you see how students are leading their Clubs:



At Clark Advanced learning Center in Stuart, the student leaders wanted a way to highlight the churches and student ministries of the members of their clubs. They created a Google form for students to fill out and a QR

code that leads students to the form. When the time comes to discuss the importance of being part of a local church, the leaders can look at the form and share the information with students who do not have a church home.

At Jensen Beach High, students took our evangelism tool, The Four, and created a large poster to be able to show to the entire club. They use the different symbols on the poster to tell the story of the gospel and how we can have a relationship with Christ. This gave them an



incredible visual tool for their meetings to be able to learn how to share the gospel with their friends.

When adults hear of how the students are leading their clubs, they are always amazed. At First Priority, we not only have a heart to reach the next generation, but we have a heart to equip and prepare them to reach their generation. Student leadership is one of the best ways we know for students to learn to be fully devoted followers of Christ.

PROMISING FUTURE

n just 2 ½ years, Indian River County and the Space Coast have grown from just 3 clubs in Sebastian to 39 First Priority Clubs!

Here's the latest on our club activities:

INDIAN RIVER

- Currently: 9 out of the 10 Middle and High Schools in Indian River County have a First Priority Club.
- By the end of the school year. We are projecting to be in every Middle and High School in the County. That is 10 out of 10 clubs.

SPACE COAST

- Currently: 29 out of the 39 Middle and High Schools on the Space Coast have a First Priority Club.
- By the end of the school year. We are projecting to have a First Priority Club in 35 out of 39 Middle and High Schools on the Space Coast.

How did we get here?
Prayer, Church Partnership, and Youth Leader
Networks!

- Our prayer newsletter has grown to several hundred.
- We have 36 strategic church partnerships!
- We have expanded our Youth Pastor/ Leader Networks from 4 to 6 locations.

Expanding from 4 monthly area meetings to 6 has allowed us to connect with 12-15 additional youth leaders every month. Our outreach is to about 60+ Youth Leaders. Each meeting has 3 key elements:

- God Stories: We begin by sharing inspiring stories from the campuses, celebrating the work that God has accomplished within our clubs. These stories are a source of encouragement and strength for each leader.
- Youth Ministry Topics: Each month, we delve into a specific youth ministry topic to bolster the local church youth group. Last month, we explored "1-on-1 Evangelism," providing insights into sharing the message of Jesus on a personal level, particularly on a Wednesday night.
- Prayer. We conclude our gatherings with a time of prayer for one another.

Each of these segments is thoughtfully allotted 20 minutes, making the most of our lunchtime meetings. This not only fosters unity among our club mentors but also allows me the opportunity to distribute essential club supplies and resources, ensuring that our clubs have what they need to thrive.

I am so excited to be part of First Priority in Indian River and the Space Coast! Together, Jesus is being boldly proclaimed on campus, and the future looks incredibly promising.

LEADING BY EXAMPLE

According to Barna Research, 90% of students in public schools don't know Christ. But, over the last 25 years, we have seen the move of God in public school all across South Florida. One of our core values at First Priority is that our EPIC clubs are student led. Jeremy Reyes, a student leader at South Dade Senior High, has taken ownership of his faith and the First Priority club on his campus. We sat down with Jeremy to see how First Priority has influenced his relationship with Christ inside and outside of school.

How did you hear about First Priority?

"The Youth Pastor at my church, El Buen Samaritano, knows Mike the Miami Director for First Priority. Mike was leading the club on campus and my youth pastor suggested that I attend. I went to a club meeting and loved it! I've been attending the club for 3 years and this is my first year being a student leader."

What's the best part about your First Priority club meetings?

"It brings me joy learning about the Gospel and sharing the Gospel with students at my school and I really enjoy building connections with other students."

Beyond the Classroom:

As our interview progressed, Jeremy opened up about the realities of being a student leader with First Priority and how it has helped him be more intentional in his walk with Christ: "even when I don't want to pray, I pray. And I read my Word because I know First Priority is coming up." He shares the importance of leading by example because students in the club are looking up to him for leadership and guidance. Developing student leaders in our EPIC clubs is essential to the framework of First Priority, not only for legal purposes but, this generation proves time and time again that they are no longer the church of the future, they are the church of today. In this season of his walk with Christ and leading in First Priority, the Lord has been teaching Jeremy spiritual and relational discipline.

How do you measure success in ministry? Is it by the number of salvations? Attendance on a Sunday? How can we measure the supernatural? And why would we? Nonetheless, we see time and time again that society measures success linearly. Moving forward is progress and with time, progress is success. But, there are many full circle moments in ministry that proves success isn't linear, rather, it is being in position where God needs you to be.

Andrew Gottfried, our former Director of Community Engagement, shares his introduction to First Priority and how this ministry has made a lasting impact on his life.

When did you first hear about First Priority? I heard about First Priority when I was a 6th grade student at Coral Springs Middle School. The first week I attended club was invite week and I came for the free donut. One of the special aspects of that day was Chris Lane happened to be the guest speaker.

What impact has FP made on your relationship with Christ? First Priority gave me the opportunity to connect with like-minded believers at my public middle school. Coming from a Christian elementary school, I was having a difficult time finding a friend group in which I felt comfortable. Not only did First Priority lead me to that solid friend group I was seeking, it also gave me a clear path to invite others to learn about and experience the relationship with Jesus that I had.

How would you explain your "full circle moment" with FP? It has been a blessing to serve on the Game Day team within First Priority, but everything came full circle when I had the honor to join at the Invite week at Coral Springs Middle. The Youth Pastor who was supposed to be present for the Club could not make it, so 14 years after being a student at the CSMS First Priority Club, I had the blessing of leading Club that day and witnessing three middle school students give their lives to Christ that day!




